Our Scholarship has now been awarded for 16 years, though in that time there have been 17 beneficiaries, as one year we awarded two. Wilfrid, who loved the theatre and its technologies with all of his generous heart, would be thrilled and amazed. What would he make of the technologies that exist now?

Until 2016, the scholarship consisted of a cash grant of \$2000 to assist with second year study fees at School of Performance and Screen Arts, Unitec, and, through the generosity of Oceania and the Maidment Theatre, paid work over the December/January holidays. The cash grant rose to \$2500 in 2011.



As the landscape in Auckland tertiary training in the industry changed, in 2016 we opened the scholarship up to School of Audio Engineering (SAE) and Mainz Institute of NZ which delivers music and audio courses from Certificates to Graduate Diplomas. We continue to give the \$2,500 grant but it is offered at a wider group of training institutions to assist with study in whatever way works for the recipient. We also give two weeks' work - a kind of apprenticeship worked out in collaboration with the recipient and places of work that will benefit their future plans. The extensive connections of the Trustees in the industry make this an exciting and unique opportunity for any winner. We now also present the winner with an industry tool, a work tool for life and a tangible memento of the scholarship. Costing about \$500, this may come with a mysterious name 'Fluke' or 'Aston Spirit' - the first being a top-of-theline multimeter and clamp meter set; the other a studio multi-pattern microphone.

In total the scholarship has distributed \$34,500 to the world of theatre through the students. Another \$3000 was donated to Silo Theatre in 2011.

Our board of trustees has changed as we have gone along. In the last two years, Paul Minifie and Paul Jeffery, founding Trustees, both moved out of Auckland. We miss them both. Paul Minifie served the Trust as chair until 2016 - and we could not have been more fortunate. His gentle manner and sonorous tones always put our candidates at ease. He knew exactly the right questions to ask our interviewees. He was generous with his time and with the profound knowledge of all aspects of theatre that his working life had given him. We miss him a lot. Paul J offered extensive experience with the technical aspects of theatre and generously shared Oceania's reach in the theatre and the entertainment world. We were fortunate indeed to have them serve our Trust. Replacing them we have, serendipitously, Paul Nicoll, the first recipient of a scholarship, and

Andrew Malmo, Production Manager at Auckland Theatre Company. Neil Heathcote, formerly Operations Director, Oceania, served for a year on the Trust before moving on to Rocket Lab.

Steve Marshall, Programme Development Partner, Unitec; Simon Garrett, GM Lighting, Oceania; and Penny Hansen, all founding Trustees, continue.

A very significant and unexpected consequence of the scholarship interview is that most often, not only the winner but also other applicants, find job opportunities within the industry. The interviews benefit all involved. The Trustees see future employees, the young people who are coming into their industry; the applicants themselves, not only the winner, get job opportunities straight out of the interview. These interviews have become for some a bridge between study and work and an important aspect of what the scholarship achieves.
